Odin Finds A Perfect Perch in His New Forever Home

We introduced you to Odin in our December 2016 Feline Forum. Thanks to donations to our Vincent Fund, he was able to get the care he needed after a BB lodged near his spine caused him to lose the use of his back legs. He recovered from the surgery to remove the BB, though he still had limited function. We were optimistic Odin might find a forever home with a family equipped to accommodate his special needs, however, and in October 2017, this wish came true.

Karli had been touched by a story she saw online about a cat with mobility challenges (@_gochloego_ on Instagram), and she began to research to see if her home and lifestyle could accommodate such a pet. Karli saw our July Instagram post about Odin, and her interest was piqued. After multiple visits with Odin and discussions with our operations manager, Karli and her boyfriend, Edgar, were confident that, with a few simple modifications, their home could be ready for him.

Odin has acclimated well to his new surroundings. We have confirmation that he is spoiled! While he can maneuver



the few steps in his split-level home, he will call out for a lift when the mood hits. Odin's



additional requirements include regulated trips to the litter box and physical therapy. He has two new best feline buds, Bear and El, both of whom are also Cat Welfare alums. A favorite group pastime is watching out the big picture window. Odin also enjoys roughhousing with Bear and napping with El.

Karli encourages others not to be reluctant to consider a special needs pet. It is more work, but she believes Odin understands they are going the extra mile for him. Bear and El take for granted that they can jump up in the window box. Odin chirps in gratitude when he is lifted there with his feline siblings.

Crime Cats Mystery Club Wraps Up Another Fun Reading Season

Foster Care Families Needed

Our 2017 adoption success would not have happened without the dedication of our spectacular foster team! Being a foster care parent or family for Cat Welfare can be a rewarding experience. You have a chance to provide a shelter cat or kittens with the necessary TLC they need until they are ready to live in the shelter and be considered for adoption.

Kittens, once approved for shelter intake, go into foster care if they are not old enough to be spayed or neutered when they arrive. Some litters have a mom, who accompanies them in foster care, while others arrive motherless. An adult cat may be placed in foster care if he or she needs time to recover from an injury and would fare better outside of the shelter.

Foster care commitments can range from one week to a couple of months. We do ask that you have a room in your home where the foster(s) can live without interacting with any of your pets until they are fully vaccinated and have been approved for interaction by our shelter veterinarian. This important requirement is not only for the sake of the foster but for your fur babies, too. We will provide you with food, litter, a litter box and any required medications for the fosters. Our foster care commitment and application form can be found online at catwelfareassoc.org/volunteer. A new foster training session will be held on March 21 at 5:30 p.m.

Apply for a CWA Board Position

Do you have extensive knowledge of the shelter, or skills in organizational management, finance, fundraising, marketing, computer technology, cat care or other areas that might be beneficial to Cat Welfare? If you have any of these attributes and want to make a difference, please consider submitting an application to serve as a Board member of Cat Welfare. Board members are required to participate in scheduled meetings, work on committees, raise funds and act as ambassadors for the organization.

Prospective Board members must be Active Members or Life Members for at least two consecutive years immediately preceding the election, with evidence of ongoing involvement with the organization. Members will be elected to fill Board openings at the membership meeting on May 15, 2018. Board members must be at least 18 years of age.
